Sylvia Cameron 2022-2023 Chair Our charity project for the past year was placemats for MEALS on WHEELS. Two different placemat distributions were completed

The first distribution was in Dec of 2023 using holiday fabric which created 260 placemats, 21 "clothing protectors" and 13 microwave bowls. April 17 was a delivery of 181 placemats, 62 "Clothing Protectors", 2 microwave bowls, 5 placemats for veterans, and 3 holiday placemats.

The membership voted at the May 13th meeting to make placemats for Veterans as their 2024 charity project. More information will be presented by the next charity chairman.



Cynthia reminded everyone to bid on the birthday bundles, visit the scrap bag table and there will be a 50/50 raffle today.


Cynthia then called for a vote for the new Board that will be inducted today

Fran Oblander drew names for prizes for those who sold 20 or more raffle tickets.


A brief recess was called.

ONLY A QUILTER

We've all heard the classic line that only a quilter would take yards and yards of material, cut it into little pieces and then sew them back together again. While this statement is true and a little funny to think about, it doesn't even scratch the surface of the things that only a quilter would do.

Only a Quilter would spend more hours sewing several hundreds of buttons on a quilt to embellish it, but wouldn't take five minutes to replace a button on a pair of pants.

Only a Quilter would give the gift of a wedding quilt two months after the birth of the couple's second child.

Only a Quilter would put hundreds of dollars worth of fabric into her fabric stash because she might find a use for it sometime, but wouldn't replace a 50-cent needle on her sewing machine.

Only a Quilter would let three later-arriving patients go ahead of her at the doctor's office because she is on the verge of completing a block. Only a Quilter would rush to finish a gift quilt. Not

so it's done in time for the recipient's birthday, but so it's done in time for Show and Tell.

Only a Quilter would make a special quilt to give to her son, who would then have to attend quilt shows just to see it.

Only a Quilter would use freezer paper in the production of something to keep someone warm. Only a Quilter has a welcome mat at the door to

her home and an "Enter at Your Own Risk" sign on the door of her sewing room.

Only a Quilter invites everyone to see her sewing room, then says, "Don't look at the mess."

Only a Quilter says, "I really don't need another project," then offers to make a quilt for a friend.

Only a Quilter will buy more than she'll ever need of one fabric for her stash, but slightly less than is needed of another fabric to complete a project.

Only a Quilter would give a quilt book to the guild auction then bid on it to get it back.

Only a Quilter would drive 40 miles in a hurricane to attend a quilt show, but call out to have her dinner delivered because it is drizzling.

NEW YORK BEAUTY QUILT BLOCK

The pattern we now call "New York Beauty" was first documented around 1850. Like many quilt blocks, this pattern had quite a few names which makes documenting it's history difficult. It was also called "Rocky Mountain Road", "Rocky Mountain", "Rail through the Mountains", "Crown of Thorns" and "The Great Divide". The name "New York Beauty" was used by Stearns and Foster Mountain Mist company when they published an old quilt pattern as a new design. It isn't clear why they chose that name although Stearns and Foster claimed the pattern design originated in 1776, which quilting history as we now know it disproves that notion. The name may have been linked to the crown on the Statue of Liberty and the crown-like arcs on the Chrysler Building. The traditional design includes four quarter circles or arcs, with points radiating outward from the curved seams. Vintage versions of this block were often set with pieced sashing passing through the four guarter circles with a pieced block in the intersection of the sashing. In some cases, the blocks were set diagonally with diagonal sashing as shown below.





Modern versions of the New York Beauty are paper pieced, allowing for greater variations in the design of the pattern. The quilt on the left below was made in 2008 and shows the shift in placement of the Beauty blocks, removing the sashing between the quarter circles and creating a more pattern that looks more like suns. The quilt block detail on the right below appears to be a modern design but was actually made in 1868 in Kentucky. These two quilts are great examples of the great variation in the New York Beauty designs.
